





Insurance

Coverage for your legal spouse or same-sex domestic partner and dependent children under 26 years of age are also eligible for enrollment for a monthly fee.

An optional group short-term disability plan is available if unexpected sickness or injury occurs (due to a non-work-related illness or injury). The plan provides a monthly cash benefit to help replace lost income if you are unable to work.

Before you make your journey to America, it's important that you come prepared with the following documents. O'Grady Peyton suggests that you bring the original and a photo copy of each in case the original is misplaced or stolen. Having a photo copy will make getting a replacement much easier.

Keep in mind that not every traveler will have all of the documents in the list, so just bring the documents that apply to your situation.

Passport(s)

For every country where you've received one. A strong motivation to live and work in the United States.

Application for immigrant Visa and alien registration

One copy for each applicant must be fully completed.

Birth certificate(s)

(long version with parent's names) for yourself, spouse and unmarried children younger than 21 years.

Adoption certificate

Deed poll

(if you have changed your name).

Marriage certificate

Divorce decree

Military service record

(for any service in any country).

Police certificate(s)

(required for each applicant over the age of 16—one for each country where applicant lived for at least one year after 16 years of age). Bring one original and one photocopy.

Packing for the U.S.



The following items are a guide to the items that will make your journey to the U.S. easier. Keep in mind that your O'Grady Peyton recruiter will be there to help you shop and gain access to items you may not have upon arrival.

Essential Items: To avoid extra airline baggage fees, pack lightly and plan to purchase the majority of items you'll need upon arrival.

Currency/Traveler's Checks: Bring \$5,000 U.S. in cash or traveler's cheques if you are traveling alone. In addition, bring \$1,000 U.S. for each additional person traveling with you. Secure everything and have photocopies of your travelers checks in case they are lost or stolen.

ATM Card: Make sure to inform your bank that you will be using your ATM card in America. Without notification, they may deny suspicious transactions from another country.

Credit Cards: If you have one or more, bring them with you. Credit cards are useful, but will take time for you to get in the U.S. You must first establish credit in the country before applying.

Clothing: Plan to purchase most of your clothes in the United States where it's less expensive than other countries. Once you arrive, you can determine the types of clothing you need based on the climate of the state where you'll be working.

Linens: Bring sheets and towels for yourself and any family member. If you prefer, these items can be purchased upon arrival.

Nursing Uniforms: Because hospitals have different nursing uniform requirements, it's not necessary to pack uniforms. They are easy to purchase in America.

Personal Items/Mementos: Bring your current résumé, skills checklist, copies of your certifications and diplomas, a copy of your degree(s), and pictures or small items that make you feel at home.

Non-essential Items: Pack non-essential items sparingly. Items such as small appliances (like hair dryers) will not conform to the U.S. standard voltage and can be easily purchased.


Shipping items from home: You will have a forwarding address seven to 14 days prior to your departure to the U.S. Items can be mailed from your country to that address.

Life in America

O'Grady Peyton International believes that your success is our success. To help you make the transition to America, we've put together some common things you'll need to understand to make everyday tasks easier.

American Money

American bills are the same size regardless of face value. The most common bills are \$1, \$5, \$10 and \$20. American coins have the following value:



Voltage

American standard voltage is between 110-115 volts. Most likely your plug-in appliances from abroad will not work in the U.S. You can either purchase an adapter at a hardware store or purchase new equipment at reasonable prices once you arrive.

Temperature

America uses the Fahrenheit temperature as opposed to Celsius. Typical temperatures are:

- Water Freezes: 0° Celsius or 32° Fahrenheit
- Normal Body Temperature: 34° Celsius or 98.6° Fahrenheit
- Water Boils: 100° Celsius or 212° Fahrenheit

Weights and Measures

America uses a measurement system called the U.S. customary system, which consists of the following:
